Overall situation

- The EOC received a total of 314 complaints in the past 5 months (from January to May 2007), representing an increase of 3% by 9 complaints compared with 305 in the same period last year.

DDO

• From January to May 2007, 189 complaints were received, representing an increase of 10% over the same period last year, when 172 complaints were received. 45 complaints on sick-leave were received, representing an increase of 67% over the same period last year when 27 complaints were received. There was also a slight increase in the complaints on accessibility issues, 14 cases were received from Jan to May 2007 whereas 12 cases were received in the same period last year.

SDO

• From January to May 2007, 114 complaints were received, representing a decrease of 7% over the same period in 2006, when 122 complaints were received. Most cases were related to pregnancy discrimination (52 cases) and sexual harassment (35 cases). The figures for such complaints in 2006 were 58 and 40 respectively. When compared with the same period last year, the number of complaints related to pregnancy discrimination was down by 10% and that of sexual harassment complaints decreased by 13%.

• From January to May 2007, the EOC received a total of 7,288 enquiries, representing an increase of 29% or 1,644 enquiries, compared with the same period last year when 5,644 enquiries were received.
